Appendix C:

Survey methodology

1. Survey design

A participatory approach was used to design the survey. Researchers from The Young Foundation led on the co-ordination and design, working alongside a small working group consisting of PAC Leads from across the different delivery partners. Survey topics were designed to build on research undertaken in the network's first set of research projects. YEF also contributed to the design of the survey.

The survey aimed to engage young people with lived experience of violence, defined as those who had been a victim, witness, or had perpetrated a violent crime. Specific areas of focus for the survey questionnaire were developed iteratively through meetings with the working group, drawing from their first research projects and with opportunities to feed into the wording of questions to support accessibility. This selected group of PAC Leads also tested the survey themselves, helping to further refine its design. The draft survey was then shared with all Delivery Partners during an online meeting, providing further opportunity to collect feedback before it was finalised.

For survey participants under the age of 16, they first needed their parent to complete questions around consent and demographics, before the young person could proceed with questions about their experience.

2. Data collection

Each delivery partner organisation was provided with a survey questionnaire for their region. The surveys were then delivered by each team using a 'snowballing' sampling method, with each organisation utilising their existing social networks among young people locally and tapping into new networks to share it as far as possible. The delivery partners used a number of innovative methods to share the survey. This included engaging with schools,

sharing with other local partners working with young people, and providing small non-cash incentives (such as snacks) for young people to fill out the survey in locations such as shopping centres.

3. Data analysis

Initial analysis was conducted to identify which young people among the sample had lived experience of violence, generating descriptive statistics which were separated into two categories: the numbers of young people in the overall sample, and the numbers of those with lived experience of violence. Throughout the report, comparisons are made between these two groups.
